

# Watercolour Girl





Constantly compare your drawing with the subject matter to create the most realistic and detailed effect possible. The subject matter is vitally important to your success.

Draw everything very careful, either using a grid, or tracing your image. Do not spend time using the same reference photo as we used in this tutorial, rather spend time on a similar photo that you can find on pixabay.com or pexels.com

Use the watercolour techniques to create your own magic. This is not a medium to be controlled.

Additional exercises to foster skill development

The materials that we use in the process are described on each photo

The drawing of the subject matter is on the last page for you to print

It fits on a A4 paper but you can draw it on an A3 or bigger to allow for the background

Even though your image is an A4, it will appear much bigger

# Materials used

Watercolour pencils (no specific type)

Watercolour paint

Palette

**Bowl for Water** 

Serviette's

Watercolour paper A3

We have kept the supplies as limited as possible so that ALL can do this project. You are welcome to use any medium you have, but our suggestion is to use what you've got. You can even use a ink pen even though this tutorial does not cover the techniques.

#### PRINTING OPTIONS


This tutorial is designed for the artist to be printed. This gives you the advantage not to sit on your phone or ipad all the time. Printing options can be used to print 4 pages per sheet. See you software options. You can then fold the printed pages into a booklet format.

#### STEP 1


Grid your image onto your paper or use tracing paper, or lightbox. Image is a .pdf attachment. This tutorial has its own challenges and the more accurate you can duplicate this image the better. You can also paste your reference photo on a window with a good back lighting to enable you to trace the most information as possible. Make sure that you DO NOT have hard lines, if so, erase as you start layering the layers in the follow steps.



STEP 2 Darken the hair with a 2B graphite pencil. The hair will be left in graphite and not be painted at all.



STEP 3
Use a sharp watercolor pencil to draw in the eyes.
Use green on the outside circle with a blue overlay
Next add yellow ochre around the pupil
Add black inside the pupil area




STEP 4
Blend with a small brush, leaving the white area untouched
Add layers of color to create the realistic effect.

Lift some color by holding the brush on the eye for a second or two and wipe the brush continuously on the serviette



STEP 5
Repeat step 4 on the other eye
Use a yellow ochre pencil to lay in the contour of the nose and eye
Fill in the purple around the eye



STEP 6
Start blending with the wide watercolor brush.
Repeat dipping the brush in water, blending, dry on serviette and repeat
If the paint is too dark, fill the brush with water and lift the color.




Fill in the dark areas with brown pencil

Use dark purple as an overlay

Add yellow ochre on the cheek and add dark brown into the nostrils

NOTE: This is the funny stage. Your image will look like a mess and that is perfect for now, just carry on and look at shape of the colour. Don't think nose...think shape



STEP 8

Add brown under the nose and on the side of the mouth and purple underneath the mouth Blend with the big brush by using moderate amount of water.

Work this area into the different layers to achieve a dark value tone



The area around the nose might be too wet to continue at this stage.


Start outlining the mouth with a brown pencil

Adding red and orange to the upper and bottom lip

Outline the teeth with brown

And darken under the one side of the lip with dark brown


Blend these colors together with a small brush and little water



Blend the dark side of the face and add more pencil on dry areas if needed to achieve dark values Add orange and brown to the teeth with a small brush

Use the brush to take color directly from the pencil (wipe the brush on the tip of the pencil) Finish the mouth and also use the brush directly on the pencil for darker values

Darken the sides of the mouth with brown. Go back to areas that is too light and fill in more values Paint the neck with purple and yellow ochre




STEP 11

At this stage the image changed by adding the cape. The color chosen was to compliment the eyes Erase the areas of the hair where you want to place the cape

Fill the cape with green and blue pencil

Blend with the big brush

Do not go over the hair




Start with the background using wet on wet technique

This step is the fun step where you allow the colors to do their own magic.


Wet the paper where you want to lay in the color

Then use a folded serviette to dap on wet area to create different shapes and values

Use a clean paper over the completed face to secure



STEP 13
Keep working wet on wet with the big brush
Repeat dabbing with the serviette
Fill the brush with different colors and splash the tip of the brush onto the background
Cover the face with an extra piece of paper



STEP 14
Adding finishing touches:
Complete the green cape over the shoulders
Redraw the hair in graphite
Sign your name with the small brush
